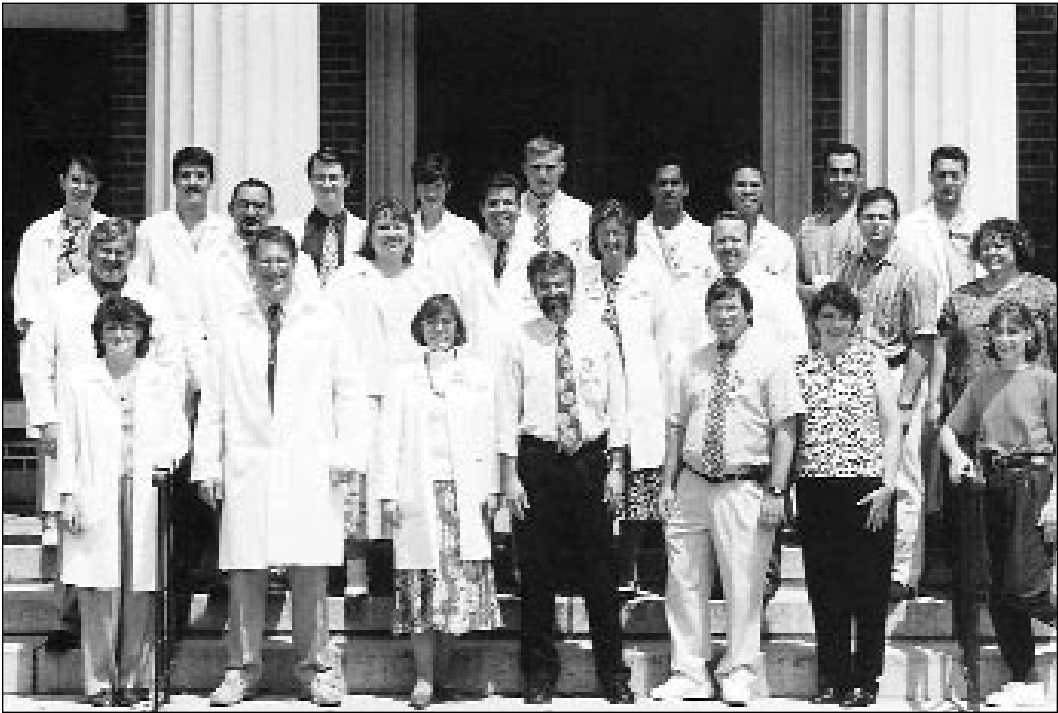

DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL MEDICINE

The Department of Environmental Medicine was recently established in this medical school to become one of the first departments in the nation to focus on human health risks from contaminants in the workplace, the home, and the ambient environment. The Department houses the Division of Respiratory Biology and Toxicology, directed by G. Oberdörster, and the Division of Occupational and Environmental Medicine, directed by M. J. Utell, M.D., the Associate Chair for Clinical Affairs. The Department is interdisciplinary, with research and teaching programs in both basic science and clinical medicine. In addition, an NIEHS Environmental Health Sciences Center is administratively housed in the Department. It focuses on environmental and occupational contaminants as risk factors for disease processes and includes faculty from 11 different departments and centers within the Medical School.

The Ph.D. program in toxicology is directed by Ned Ballatori. The first two years are spent taking required and elective courses, and rotating through laboratories of potential research advisors. The remaining years are spent in research leading to the Ph.D. Qualified students receive full tuition support and a stipend from a National Institutes of Environmental Health Sciences (NIEHS) training grant. The Department offers training opportunities for a large number of postdoctoral fellows.

A multidisciplinary curriculum has been developed in occupational/environmental medicine. During the first two years of medical school, teaching emphasizes the basic sciences (including toxicology), clinical sciences (including occupational medicine), and health care delivery. During the general clerkship, special sessions are introduced on taking occupational histories, and on the principles of occupational medicine. The fourth-year elective in occupational medicine involves interdisciplinary conferences and on-site experience at local companies. Training and education is also extended to residents in family medicine and internal medicine. The division also provides broad-based clinical services in occupational and environmental medicine, occupational rehabilitation, and ergonomics.

Fifty faculty members, both primary and secondary appointees, provide a wide choice of research opportunities for these various training programs. Complementary interests on the part of many faculty result in strong programs in environmental research in such areas as behavioral and neurobiological toxicology, genetic, reproductive, and developmental toxicology, cell and molecular toxicology, and pulmonary toxicology. Within these general areas, faculty laboratories specialize in bioactivation of xenobiotics, enzyme regulation, gene expression in carcinogenesis, membrane transport, and receptor mediated toxicity.
