What to do if...

My child's central line won't flush:

- **DO NOT flush if you meet resistance. This can cause the line to break or a blood clot to move into your child's body**
 - 1. Check to see if clamp is closed or tubing is twisted or kinked
 - 2. If there are no kinks and clamp is not closed, change the needleless access device (cap/clave) and try again
 - 3. Call your child's doctor if you are still not able to flush the line EASILY

My child's central line pulls out (partially or completely):

- 1. Apply pressure with a sterile gauze/clean material to the site to stop bleeding
- 2. Have your child sit upright
- 3. Call your doctor/ go to the emergency room immediately
- 4. Place any part of your child's central line that has come out in a container and bring it to the hospital with you

Fluid is leaking from my child's central line:

Leaking from the line itself:

- 1. Clamp the catheter (line) between your child and the site of the leak
- 2. Cover the break with a sterile gauze and tape
- 3. Call the doctor/ go to the emergency room immediately

Leaking from my child's skin around where the central line goes into his/her body:

- 1. Stop using the central line
- 2. Change your child's central line dressing if it is wet underneath
- 3. Call the doctor/go to the emergency room

When to call the doctor: (go to nearest ED after hours)

- 1. Any fever over 100.5 F
- 2. Pus-like drainage from central line site
- 3. Redness, swelling, warmth, discomfort around the site
- 4. Any concern that the line has been pulled/removed
- 5. Any concern that the line has been broken
- 6. If you are not able to flush the line easily
