DIRECTOR

Mary Beth Quaranta Morrissey, PhD, MPH, JD

Mary Beth Quaranta Morrissey, PhD, MPH, JD, holds a research fellow appointment at Fordham University's Global Healthcare Innovation Management Center, Gabelli School of Business. Dr. Morrissey also holds adjunct faculty appointments at Fordham's Graduate School of Social Service and Graduate School of Business, and Yeshiva University's Wurzweiler School of Social Work. She is past president of Division 24 of the American Psychological Association and the State Society on Aging of New York. Dr. Morrissey's work is interdisciplinary and cuts across law and policy, public health, social work, psychology, and gerontology. Dr. Morrissey also serves as senior advisor for health policy and ethics, Finger Lakes Geriatric Education Center (FLGEC), University of Rochester Medical Center. Under the joint sponsorship and support of the Collaborative for Palliative Care, FLGEC, and the Westchester County Public Private Partnership for Aging Services, Dr. Morrissey directs a post-graduate certificate program with concentrations in public health and palliative care.

Thomas V. Caprio, MD, MPH, MS, CMD, HMDC, FACP, AGSF, FAAHPM

Thomas Caprio is Professor of Medicine/Geriatrics, Psychiatry, Dentistry, Clinical Nursing, and Public Health Sciences at the University of Rochester (UR). He serves as director of the Finger Lakes Geriatric Education Center which oversees the federally funded Geriatric Workforce Enhancement Program, providing education and training related to geriatrics, palliative care, and dementia care for health care professionals and family caregivers across New York State. He is the Chief Medical Officer of UR Medicine Home Care and the Medical Director for the UR Medicine Hospice program. Dr. Caprio received his MD from the State University of New York at Buffalo, completed his residency, fellowship, and postdoctoral training at the University of Rochester Medical Center, then completed his Master of Public Health degree from the University of Rochester School of Medicine and Dentistry, and his Master's in Health Professions Education from the University of Rochester Warner Graduate School of Education. He is a fellow of the American College of Physicians, fellow of the American Geriatrics Society, and fellow of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine.

Christopher Comfort, MD

Christopher Comfort is currently the chief operating officer at Calvary Hospital, Inc, a palliative care system offering palliative inpatient hospital services, inpatient hospice services, home hospice services, and community-based palliative and case management services. Dr. Comfort has served as the Medical Director of Calvary Hospital, Calvary Hospice, and the Palliative Wound Care Center for the past twenty years.

Bruce Jennings, MA

Bruce Jennings is Adjunct Associate Professor of Health Policy at Vanderbilt University Medical School. He is also Senior Advisor at The Hastings Center, where he served from 1991 through 1999 as Executive Director. He has been active in the development of the field of public health ethics and taught one of the first courses on that subject in the country at the Yale School of Public Health from 1995-2014. From 2003-2009 he served as member and Chair of the Ethics Advisory Committee at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). From 2017-2019 he was chair of the American Public Health Association task force charged with writing a new code of ethics for Public Health. In 2020 he received a Distinguished Career Award from the American Public Health Association for his work in public health ethics. He is currently editor of a book series on Public Health and Health Policy Ethics published by Springer-Nature. A political scientist by training, Mr. Jennings has written and edited twenty-nine books and numerous articles on bioethics and public policy issues.

Melissa Lang, DrPH, MPH, MPA, MA

Melissa Lang has extensive experience in community-based non-profit health services and currently serves as President and CEO of the Agency on Aging of South Central Connecticut (AOASCC) -- an independent non-profit that provides services and supports to older adults, individuals with disabilities, and caregivers. AOASCC is also an access agency for several Medicaid waiver programs that help older adults remain in the community and avoid institutionalization, including the Connecticut Home Care Program for Elders (CHCPE), Money Follows the Person (MFP), PCA waiver, and Community First Choice (CFC). Her background includes several years of experience in hospice and palliative care, long-term care and disabilities, and cancer care. Dr. Lang is committed to the dual focus of quality of care and quality of life affecting older adults; her research interests focus on aging in place and community-based models for health services and supports. She actively engages in advocacy and policy development on issues related to long term care, family caregiving, palliative and end-of-life care, access to healthcare, and medical ethics. She serves as President-elect State Society on Aging, and formerly as a New York State Long-Term Care Ombudsman; President of The Center for Aging in Place; and as Vice Chair for the Westchester Public/Private Partnership.

PROGRAM FACULTY

Barney Newman, MD

Barney Newman, MD, Medical Director Emeritus for the WESTMED Medical Group, is a retired board-certified internist who practiced primary care internal medicine for over 31 years and had over 33 years of progressive responsibility as a physician leader. He was a co-founder and Medical Director for WESTMED Medical Group from 1999-2015 where he had responsibility for the clinical staff and organization and oversight of the clinical care provided by the group. From its founding in 2011 till his retirement in 2015, Dr. Newman was also Chief Medical Officer for WESTMED Practice Partners, a Management Services Organization. At the time of his retirement, WESTMED had grown to almost 300 physicians who cared for more than 300,000 patients. WESTMED is nationally recognized for its outstanding quality of care and use of state-of-the-art healthcare information technology.

Dr. Newman focused his career on organizing physicians in comprehensive delivery systems that were clinically integrated and delivered high quality care. Prior to his retirement, Dr. Newman held multiple academic appointments finishing his career with an academic appointment as Clinical Assistant Professor of Medicine at Cornell Medical College. He has served on the Editorial Advisory Board for the *Permanente Journal* and as the Managed Care Editor for *Medscape*. Dr. Newman is a member of the American College of Physicians and emeritus member of the American College of Physician Executives. Dr Newman is a coauthor of a recently published textbook: "A Public Health Strategy for Living, Aging and Dying in Solidarity: Designing Elder-Centered and Palliative Systems of Care, Environments, Services and Supports.

Frederick J. Wertz, PhD

Frederick Wertz earned his Ph.D. at Duquesne University in clinical psychology and currently he is Professor Emeritus, Department of Psychology, Fordham University. His career has featured psychotherapy with older adults, teaching of psychology, university administration, scholarship, editing, and service to his profession and communities. He has taught and supervised doctoral students in clinical psychology, chaired three academic departments including Psychology, and served as Interim Dean of Fordham College at Lincoln Center.

Wertz's scholarship has addressed critical perspectives on theory, history, research methodology, cultural context, and philosophical foundations of psychology. He has written on psychoanalysis, cognitive psychology, psychometrics, and qualitative research. Having developed phenomenological research methods and he has written on research methodology, e.g., *Five Ways of Doing Qualitative Analysis...* (2011, Guilford Press). He has served as editor of the *Journal of Phenomenological Psychology* and as guest editor of *The Humanistic Psychologist*. He edited *The Humanistic Movement: Recovering the Person in Psychology* (Gardner Press). Wertz served as president of the American Psychological Association's Society for Theoretical and Philosophical Psychology, Society for Humanistic Psychology, and Society for Qualitative inquiry in Psychology and is an APA Accreditation Site Visitor. He currently serves on the Community Relations Board of the Milan MI Federal Correctional Institution.

Beverly D. Carter, DM

Beverly D. Carter works with The Westchester County Department of Senior Programs and Services to identify and prioritize the needs of the elderly, then to create comprehensive and coordinated plans to meet those needs through advocacy for responsive policy, actions, resources, and legislation. She has expertise in organizational leadership, program development and design with a strong international background including extensive world travel and alumnus status with Harvard University's Center for International Development (WorldTeach ~ Kenya); medical missions with EJAYES Charities to Nigeria (Nasarawa, Kano, Abuja, Umuahia), Haiti (post-earthquake) and Educational missions in Kenya (Western Province) and Nigeria (Umuahia). Her travels prepared her well for her presentation at the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women Conference (March 2012) addressing the challenges to empowering rural women from the perspectives of educating young girls, leadership, global literacy, diversity, and social responsibility. Dr. Carter is the founder of A Renewed Life Global! LLC which is dedicated to alleviating the impact of oppression in human rights and social justice related life events and enhancing emotional health and wellness in our global communities. Michael Lepore, PhD

Michael Lepore is Vice President of the LiveWell Institute—the research, education, and advocacy hub of LiveWell Dementia Specialists—and he is also an Adjunct Assistant Professor of Health Services, Policy & Practice at Brown University. His work has blazed a trail of innovation across dementia care research, policy, and practice, building on his experience as a nurse aide in a care unit for people with dementia. Dr. Lepore has led a wide range of studies and federal reports on dementia. For five years he provided technical assistance to the U.S. Administration on Aging/ Administration on Community Living's Alzheimer's Disease Program Initiative, and his work on engaging people with dementia in research helped shape the first National Research Summit on Dementia Care and Services. Dr. Lepore serves as co-chair of the American Public Health Association (APHA) Aging & Public Health policy, and he led the authorship of APHA's policy statement, *Strengthening the Dementia Care Workforce: A Public Health Priority*. Dr. Lepore is currently associate editor of the *Gerontological Society of America's Public Policy & Aging Report*.

Katherine Pettus, PhD

Katherine Pettus is the Advocacy Officer for Palliative Care at International Association for Hospice and Palliative Care (IAHPC). Dr. Pettus holds a PhD in Political Theory from Columbia University, and a Master's degree in Health Law and Policy from the University of California San Diego. She trained in California as a hospice volunteer in 2010, joining the Leadership Development Initiative at the Institute for Palliative Medicine in 2011, and the IAHPC in 2014. Her PhD dissertation appeared as a book, 'Felony Disenfranchisement in America', now in 2nd edition with SUNY Press, and her Master's Thesis studied the interface between international law and access to internationally controlled essential controlled medicines for palliative care. As IAHPAC Advocacy Officer, Dr. Pettus attends UN organization meetings to advocate for improved availability, and rational use of opioids for palliative care as a component of the right to health. She addresses issues of global palliative care development and policy, especially those affecting older persons, as an essential element of universal health coverage throughout the life course.

Dr. Pettus grounds her global advocacy work in site visits to IAHPAC members and partners in Low- and Middle-Income countries, where she participates as often as possible in home-care visits with colleagues who work in extremely challenging circumstances to deliver palliative care to patients in need. She identifies her original role models/mentors as palliative care pioneers Dr. Anne Merriman, founder of Hospice Africa Uganda, and Dr. M.R. Rajagopal, founder of Pallium India.

Jorge Rivera-Agosto, JD, MS, HEC-C

Jorge Rivera is a health care attorney and current Medical Ethics Fellow at Northwell Health. Before joining Northwell, he was a litigator in private practice. Mr. Rivera-Agosto held positions in insurance companies, as well as government.
