(including racial/ethnic minorities, persons with disabilities, and especially, Deaf Sign Language users).



Lisa M. Lowenstein, PhD, MPH, RD is a new Preventive Cardiology Fellow in the Department of Community and Preventive Medicine. She is joining NCDHR from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill where she received her doctorate and Masters in Public Health in the

Department of Nutrition. Her dissertation examined barriers and facilitators to provide obesity counseling in pediatric primary care practices at the individual provider level, interpersonal level (provider-parent communication), and organizational level.

As a postdoctoral fellow, Dr. Lowenstein will focus on Deaf Weight Wise. In addition, she will pursue her other research interests regarding provider-parent communication about weight, diet, and physical activity and interventions to improve the assessment and management of childhood obesity in primary care practices.
