Deaf Health Survey Update Matthew Starr



Eighty-five more to go! That is how many more we need to meet the goal of 300

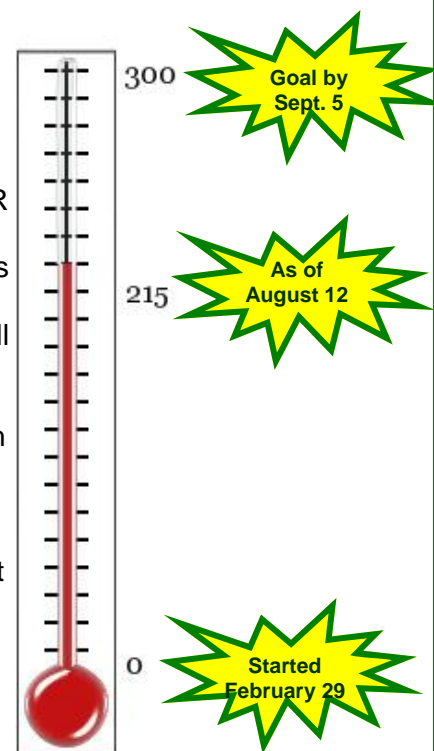
Deaf adults taking the Rochester Deaf Health Survey (see the thermometer). To date, 215 have taken the survey. Once we have 300 surveys taken, the health data will then be analyzed and presented to the Deaf community. What we are looking for is health disparity in health behaviors and health risks. Health disparity is unacceptable because it causes more health problems and higher healthcare costs. We will compare confidential survey results from two different groups of people, Deaf adults taking the sign language survey and hearing people taking the telephone survey. Both groups must live within Monroe County (NY) to

be able to make valid comparison. Suppose one group has a higher rate for diabetes than the other group, then a health disparity is found. Eliminating health disparities is necessary to increase quality of life and reduce health care costs.

The Deaf Health Community Committee (DHCC) will work with NCDHR researchers to determine which health condition impacts the Deaf community the most. Then intervention research will be conducted to see what works best in preventing disease and eliminating health disparity. An example of an intervention research would be an educational program in ASL to prevent disease - will it work better than reading a printed brochure?
