Quick Tidbits to Make Your Research Life Easier

SPOTLIGHT ON THE DIVISION OF REPRODUCTIVE ENDOCRINOLOGY

The Division of Reproductive Endocrinology has long-standing clinical interests in infertility treatment with active programs in ovulation induction, intrauterine insemination and in vitro fertilization. The clinical program includes 4 board certified subspecialty physicians, 2 nurse practitioners as well as 8 clinical nurses and a full IVF and andrology laboratory. Despite the busy clinical program the division also supports and active research arm. Lynda Kochman is the clinical research coordinator for the division and has been actively involved in recruitment and retention of all aspects of divisional clinical research.

Since 2000, the division has been nationally funded in research on polycystic ovary syndrome (PCOS). Dr. Kathleen Hoeger has been actively investigating the role of lifestyle management and metformin in obese adolescent and adult women with PCOS. Since 2000, the division has had 31 abstracts accepted for presentation nationally, including 5 with residents as the presenting author. Publications from this research have appeared in Fertility & Sterility as well as the Journal of Clinical Endocrinology and Metabolism.

Dr. Vivian Lewis has been studying the role of antioxidants in sperm function in infertile men. Her work has led to several national presentations including the finding that increased soy intake was associated with improved DNA fragmentation index, a measure of sperm function. Her publications have appeared in Fertility & Sterility, The International Journal of Andrology and Women's Health Issues.

The division is currently collaborating with the Center for Reproductive Epidemiology on studies of sperm function in young men to assess the impact of beef consumption in their mother's pregnancy on subsequent semen parameters. This work is being funded by the European Union. The division looks forward to moving forward with additional programs in collaboration. We also plan to welcome a new physician in the summer of 2009, Dr. Adam Griffin, from Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston. His research interests include stem cell potential from amniotic fluid.

NIH'S NEW PUBMED CENTRAL REQUIREMENT

The NIH Public Access policy mandates public access to the results of NIH funded research in order to advance science and improve human health. The policy applies to all peer-reviewed articles based on research funded by NIH that are accepted for publication on or after **April 7, 2008.** Authors are required to submit, or have submitted for them, an electronic copy of their final peer-reviewed manuscript to PubMed Central (PMC) upon acceptance for publication, where it will be made available to the public no

later than 12 months after publication. If cited articles in a grant application are not in compliance with the policy, NIH will not review the application.
