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National Community Committee (NCC) Annual Meeting October 19-21, 2011

October 18, 2011, members from the National Community Committee (NCC) flew in from all over the country to attend the NCC Annual Meeting, held in Rochester, NY. With a busy few days ahead of them, a few members attended the leadership team meetings, and then prepared for the following days' agenda.

Wednesday evening, October 19, 2011 the rest of the NCC members arrived and everyone gathered at the National Technical Institute for the Deaf (NTID) at RIT for an opening reception. Dr. Thomas Pearson said a few words welcoming everyone. John T. Reid, the previous chair of the Deaf Health Community Committee (DHCC), addressed the group about NCDHR's community committee, the DHCC.



Other speakers included Jim DeCaro, Dean Emeritus of NTID, and Gerald Buckley, the current President of NTID. 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American Public Health Association (APHA) Annual Meeting and Exposition October 30– November 2, 2011

From October 30 – November 2, some staff members of NCDHR attended the recent APHA Annual Meeting and Exposition. APHA was held in Washington DC with people attending from all over the country. Kim Kelstone and Denise Thew created posters and presented them to APHA attendees. Mike McKee, Jessica Cuculick (a past chair of the DHCC), Carlene Mowl, and Tiffany Panko all had PowerPoint presentations.

The Poster and PowerPoint presentations took place throughout the entire conference. The topics included "Collecting Research Data from deaf ASL users: How do we know we're asking the right questions?" (Carlene Mowl), "Task Force on Health Care Careers for the Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing Community: Update and Short Term Recommendations." (Michael McKee), "Providing Healthcare Access to Deaf People: Is Interpreting a universal accommodation?" (Kim Kelstone), "Do features of culture and language support breastfeeding success in Deaf mothers?" (Jessica Cuculick), "Using video blogs as a community engagement tool to overcome research knowledge gaps in Deaf communities" (Tiffany Panko), and "Tailoring a Health Living Intervention to Deaf Adults: Sociocultural Data from the Target Group" (Denise Thew).

Each of the presentation/posters were very well attended, with people asking many insightful questions. Some highlights of the event were from Jessica Cuculick and Tiffany Panko's presentations. At the end of Tiffany Panko's presentation, Tiffany was approached by a leading Community Based Participatory Research (CBPR) researcher. Jessica Cuculick's presentation was so impactful, that the moderator forgot to introduce the next speaker.

Among the NCDHR staff who had presentations/posters accepted, two past NCDHR interns were also fortunate enough to attend the weekend's events; Kyle Gahagan and Ian DeLandrea-Lazarus. The two were able to attend many of the sessions at the conference.
