Dear Friends,



# THE LARC INITIATIVE

SUPPORTED BY
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The LARC Initiative offers education on Long Acting
Reversible Contraception (LARC) to adults who talk to teens
in both community and healthcare settings. We completed
30 LARC talks this year reaching 363 people and
participated in 19 other community events which reached
nearly 400 additional people.

The LARC initiative continues to participate with various community partners who are engaged in reducing unintended pregnancy including the Latino Health Coalition through Common Ground Health, the Metro Council for Teen Potential, the Youth Services Quality Council, and Rochester's Sexual and Reproductive Justice Task Force.
